OUR MISSION

Who We **Are**

The Royal Military Colleges of Canada Alumni Association Inc. is the Alumni Association for anyone who has attended any program (undergraduate, post-graduate or continuing studies) at a Canadian Military College, whether it is the Royal Military College of Canada, Collège militaire royal de Saint-Jean, or Royal Roads Military College (and its predecessors). The RMC Alumni Association is an independent, not-for-profit corporation and registered charity deeply committed to the ongoing advancement and enhancement of the Canadian Military Colleges (CMCs). Supporting the CMCs’ four pillars (academics, bilingualism, military leadership and physical fitness), our mission is driven by the belief that the CMCs are more than just educational institutions – they are a foundational part of the profession of arms in Canada, the forge for Canada’s future leaders in military and industry, who will go on to make significant contributions to our nation in many fields.

Our alumni are spread across the country and around the world, but our connection to the CMCs and to each other remains strong. With more than 73 active classes spanning entry-years from 1952 to 2025, and branches in major cities across Canada fostering close ties among alumni, we believe in the power of this network to enhance the personal and professional lives of our members, whether they are current students, serving members of the Canadian Armed Forces or veterans, while also strengthening the CMCs.



What We Do



At the core of our work are two objectives: bringing together the alumni of the Canadian Military Colleges for mutual support, and a steadfast commitment to advancing education and leadership development at the CMCs to support Canada's future leaders. We achieve these objectives by bringing together alumni, whether undergraduate, graduate or continuing studies, and other members for their mutual benefit, support, mentorship and camaraderie through our support of branches, classes and other groups of alumni. We advance education by establishing and maintaining scholarships, bursaries and prizes while also supporting and promoting training and leadership programs to provide funding for initiatives that will help benefit the CMCs to grow and develop Canada's future leaders. We establish and preserve commemorating monuments and significant heritage sites at the CMCs, enhancing, preserving, and promoting the Colleges' unique experiences, histories, traditions, and cultures. Our efforts ensure that current and future generations of Naval and Officer Cadets and post-graduate or continuing studies students benefit from the same values – Truth, Duty, Valour – that have shaped so many of Canada's leaders.

Why We **Do It**

Supporting the CMCs is not just about investing in institutions; it's about investing in the future of Canada. The leaders trained and educated at the CMCs will go on to guide our country through challenges yet to come whether in military service or in civilian life, and we must ensure they are prepared to meet those challenges with courage, integrity, and respect.

The establishment of the Royal Military College of Canada in Kingston, of the Royal Canadian Naval College at Royal Roads (later RRMN) in Victoria, and Collège militaire royal de Saint-Jean in Saint-Jean sur Richelieu were important steps in evolving from the Colonial Period to create the cadre of the professional force for Canada as a nation. Whether individuals remain in the profession of arms or move into other fields, their connection to the CMCs remains strong. The CMCs are more than just a place where Naval and Officer Cadets experience the excitement of post-secondary education; enrollment represents a commitment to serving their country, exemplifying each student's bravery in making that choice.



Creating Leaders and Changing Lives



Battlefield tours

In February, RMC Naval and Officer Cadets walked the battlefields of France and Belgium on the Mottershead Battlefield Tour through a nine-day immersive history experience made possible by the generosity of Ian and Rosemary Mottershead. From the trenches of the Somme to the Menin Gate in Ypres, students encountered the legacies of Canadian service and sacrifice, gaining perspective on leadership, courage, and the human cost of war.

Military Skills Teams

RMC Saint-Jean achieved a remarkable result at the Sandhurst Military Skills Competition, placing 3rd overall out of 48 teams from 15 countries and securing 1st place among international teams. The Royal Military College of Canada team also impressed with a strong 4th place finish.

Thanks to the generosity of the Classes of 1964 and 1969, who contributed nearly \$80,000 through the RMC Alumni Association, both colleges' teams were able to compete on the world stage and showcase Canadian excellence.



Combat Weapons Team

The Combat Weapons Team trains Cadets in advanced fighting drills with the C7 rifle, C8 carbine, Browning 9mm pistol, and Remington 12 gauge shotgun. Their training covers tactical reloading, weapon transitioning, fire and movement, and multiple target engagements — skills applied in two- and three-gun matches across Eastern Ontario and with the U.S. Military Academies.

RMC Saint-Jean International Travel

In March 2025, Officer Cadets Lavallée and Batt represented RMC Saint-Jean on a cultural visit to Georgia. Their program included leadership exercises and exchanges with international peers, with Officer Cadet Lavallée receiving the Leadership Award. Both students noted the impact of these opportunities, made possible with RMC Alumni Association support.



Great North Excursion

Fourteen RMC Saint-Jean Cadets joined Exercice Xérus Nordique in Chisasibi, Quebec. Training with the 6th Battalion of the Royal 22e Régiment and the Canadian Rangers, they experienced subarctic field operations and engaged with Cree community members. The exercise, supported by the RMC Alumni Association, combined military learning with cultural exchange.



RMC Saint-Jean Band

Over the past three years, the RMC Saint-Jean music group has grown from an idea shared by two students into a dynamic ensemble of nearly 20 musicians. Thanks to the dedication of volunteers, professional mentors, and strong alumni support, the group now performs at parades, regimental dinners, and official ceremonies.



RMC Men's Varsity Volleyball Trip to Kamloops

In 2024, the RMC Men's Volleyball team traveled to Kamloops, B.C., to face Trinity Western, Thompson Rivers, and the University of the Fraser Valley. Made possible by the generous support of the RMC Alumni Association, this trip was an important step in the team's development as they prepare for the 2025 season.



RMC Women's Varsity Volleyball

The RMC Alumni Association will provide \$35,000 to fund the RMC Women's Volleyball Team's participation in the University of Winnipeg/Manitoba Invitational this year. This event is a premier pre-season competition. The tournament brings together top-ranked teams from across Canada, offering our athletes invaluable experience, exposure, and recruitment opportunities



RMC Women's Rugby

In 2025/26, the RMC Alumni Association is providing \$12,000 to support the RMC Women's Rugby Team's participation in the New York 7s Tournament. This builds on support first offered in 2023, when funding allowed the team to travel, compete, and proudly represent RMC in Paladins apparel.



RMC Debating and International Affairs Society (DIAS)

Earlier this year, six members of RMC's Debate and International Affairs Society (DIAS) competed at McMUN, Canada's largest Model United Nations conference, hosted by McGill University. Representing countries and historical figures across diverse committees — from international aviation to African border disputes — the students honed their skills in diplomacy, debate, and resolution writing.



35th NATO Chess Championship

Thanks to support from the Class of 1962, Officer Cadet Mueller represented RMC at the 35th NATO Chess Championship in Poland. Their donation helped make possible a historic performance — RMC's best result in the tournament's history. Mueller earned 3 points with 2 wins, 2 draws, and 3 losses, marking the highest score ever achieved by an RMC Cadet.

RMC Saint-Jean Homecoming

Homecoming Reunion

The Homecoming Reunion at RMC Saint-Jean was held on August 22 and 23 and it proved to be a great gathering for all. This occasion coincided with the recognition of the recruits at RMCSJ who became, after their recruit camp, true Preparatory Naval and Officer Cadets. Exceptionally this year, there were no Juniors in the ranks. The recruits, after having spent a month at the Saint-Jean Garrison Leadership and Recruit School, were welcomed at RMCSJ by the Alumni at the opening of the great north gates, next to the Married Quarters, in early August. The Alumni responded in large numbers to meet at the Alma Mater and re-immersed themselves in both the festive and traditional atmosphere of the RMCSJ.

On Saturday, the new Naval and Officer Cadets received the Canadian Military Colleges insignia in the presence of their loved ones, College staff, and Alumni. The parade went off flawlessly, marking the official integration of Naval and Officer Cadets into the College. The Class of 1975 was also honoured and inducted into the Old Brigade, adding a touching moment of tradition and reunion. Another milestone achieved for Naval and Officer Cadets on this day, filled with pride, courage, and unforgettable memories.



85th Anniversary of Royal Roads

2025 marks 85 years since the founding of Royal Roads in December 1940. First established as HMCS Royal Roads to train naval officers during the Second World War, it grew into a tri-service military college, welcoming degree-granting status in 1975. Though the college closed in 1995, its legacy endures through its alumni and the beautiful historic site. We celebrate Royal Roads as a cornerstone of Canada's military education and national story.



RMC Reunion Weekend

25th Annual Legacy Dinner

The 25th Annual Legacy Dinner brought together a sold-out crowd of senior staff, alumni, spouses, friends, and sponsored cadets for an evening of camaraderie and celebration. Highlights included two cheque presentations – \$550,000 from the Class of 1980 as their Old Brigade Entry Gift, and \$45,500 from the Ottawa Branch – and an inspiring keynote speech by astronaut and RMC Alumni Jameel Janjau (RMC 2000), who shared his remarkable path from cadet to space pilot.





Obstacle Course

First-year Naval and Officer Cadets showcased teamwork, determination, and grit in this year's obstacle course, with 2 Squadron taking the win. Upon completion, cadets received a coin and handshake from alumni, marking their place in the RMC community.



Badging Parade

The 2025 RMC Badging/ Reunion weekend featured the inaugural four-week Orientation and Integration program for first years, capped by the Badging Parade for the Class of 2029. Alumni and Training Wing staff presented cap badges, officially welcoming new Naval and Officer Cadets into the Cadet Wing.



Memorial Arch Parade

Following the Badging Parade, alumni gathered for the traditional Memorial Arch Parade, honouring those who gave their lives in service to Canada. The Arch, donated in 1924, continues to symbolize the enduring bond between RMC and its alumni.

Old Brigade Dinner

The Old Brigade Dinner, first held in 1950, remains a cherished tradition for alumni 50 years beyond entry to the Colleges. This year's gathering once again united these distinguished alumni to parade, reconnect, and celebrate their shared legacy.



Impact on Canada

45 Years of Women at the CMCs

In 2025, the RMC Alumni Association proudly marked milestones that have shaped both the Colleges and the Canadian Armed Forces. This year we celebrated 45 years since women were first admitted to RMC Kingston and RMC Saint-Jean in 1980, more than 40 years since the first women graduated through the ROTP and RETP, and the same milestone since women entered Royal Roads in 1984.

A military education is demanding by design, and for the first women cadets it came with added challenges. They entered a male-dominated environment where not everyone believed they should be there. These anniversaries remind us that while the transition may not feel like distant history, it has profoundly shaped today's Colleges. Among living alumni, more have experienced gender-integrated institutions than male-only ones. Over the last four decades, the Colleges have been enriched by the leadership of women and men alike, many of whom have gone on to serve Canada with distinction.

Enabling Research at the Canadian Military Colleges

The RMC Alumni Association's support of the Canadian Military Colleges goes beyond connecting their alumni and providing financial support for Canada's future leaders. Since 2005, the Alumni Association (formerly, the RMC Foundation), has fulfilled an essential service for RMC, acting as a trustee by holding and disbursing funds of research grants from the federal granting councils(1), and other partnership grants, through a Memorandum of Understanding. As of 31 December 2024, the Alumni Association held over \$9M in research funds. In 2024, the Association provided payroll services for approximately 80 research assistants, across RMC's research groups, centers and institutes in engineering, science, the humanities and defence studies. Over \$2.1M in new grant funds were received from the Government (\$1.7M), other universities (\$184K), and industry (\$205K).

Support from the Alumni Association enables research that would not otherwise happen in areas that are critical to Canada's national security, such as cyber, nuclear science, environmental science, space application, military and veterans' health, military history, war studies and defence studies, among others. In addition, the Alumni Association continues to hold in trust the research bursary funds for the Principal's Office.

RMC ALUMNI ASSOCIATION BY THE NUMBERS

Members



Since 1876, more than 30,000 alumni have attended the Canadian Military Colleges. CMC alumni are leaders in the Canadian Armed Forces and woven into the fabric of Canada as leaders in business, science and technology, education, and politics. In supporting the CMCs, we are helping to build Canada's future. The RMC Alumni Association, created in 2021 through the merger of the RMC Club and RMC Foundation, is governed by a Board of 20 elected and 5 appointed members, overseeing a staff of 8. Any person who has attended a program at a Canadian Military College in a degree-granting or designated certificate program is eligible to be a member.

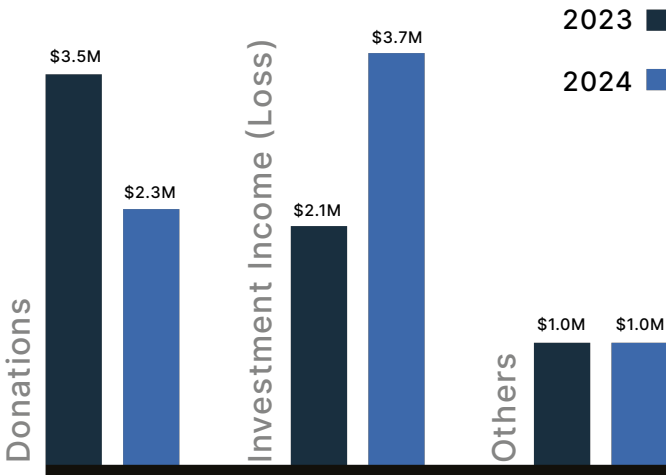
Summary of Financial Operations

Fiscal year 2024 was characterized by an excess of revenues over expenditures (net income) of \$3.1 million compared to a net excess of \$3.4 million in 2023, facilitated by favorable investment performance. As of December 31, 2024, the RMCAA reported approximately \$45 million in assets, including approximately \$34 million for supporting the activities and mandate of the Association and approximately \$9 million in research funds to support the Colleges’ research projects.

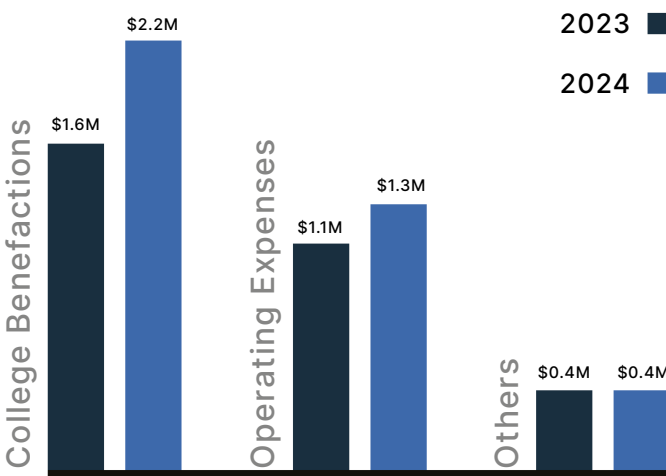
Unlike public universities or allied service academies, the CMCs are currently restricted by government policy from receiving major capital gifts. While this limits the RMC Alumni Association’s ability to fund much-needed infrastructure upgrades, the RMC Alumni Association is a significant contributor to the life of the CMCs.

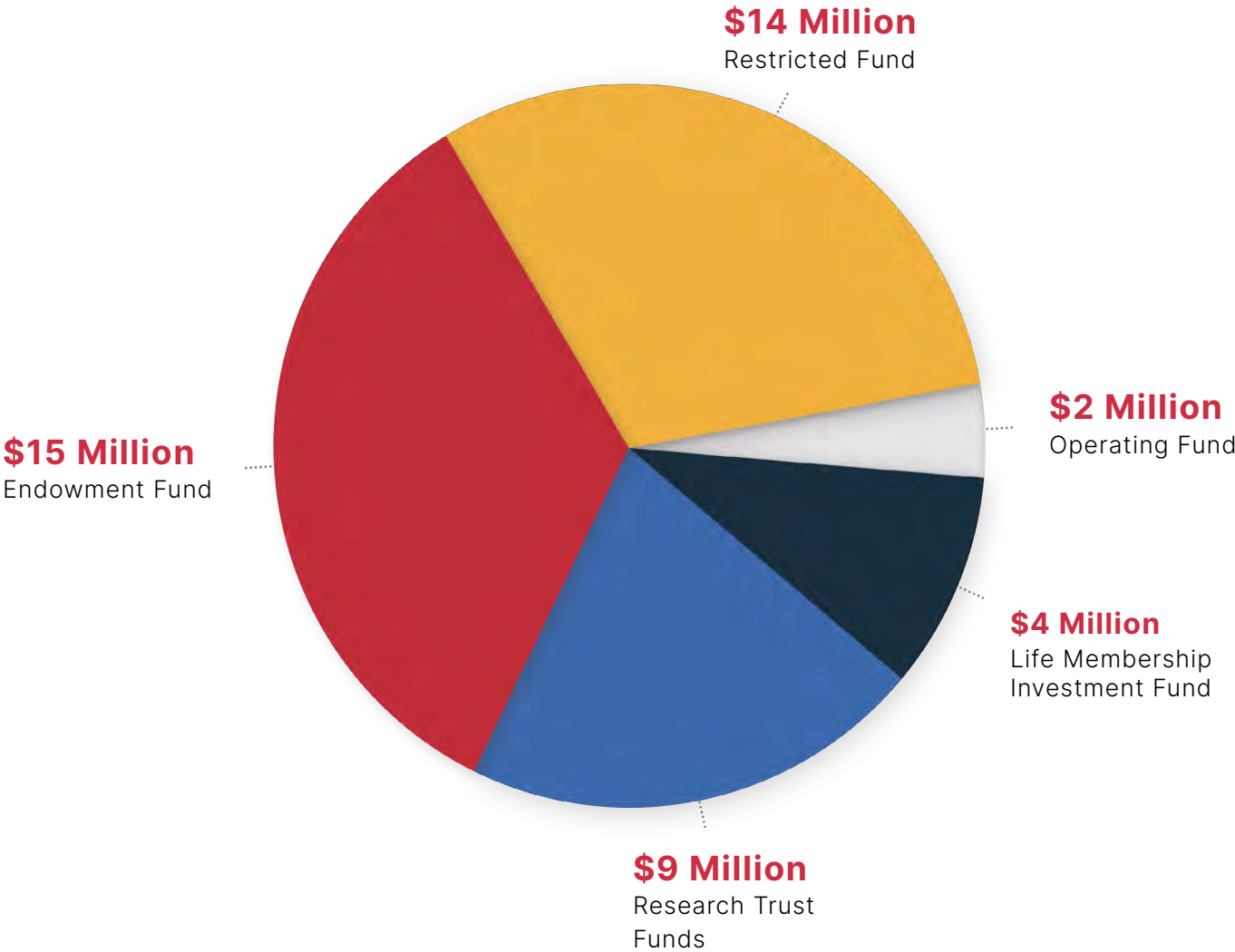
Key Sources of Revenues

A New **Membership Model** (And Benefits)!

For over a century, alumni of Canada's Military Colleges have sustained their alma maters through a tradition of paid memberships. From the founding of the RMC Club in 1884 to the creation of the Royal Military Colleges Alumni Association, membership dues provided vital funding and connection.

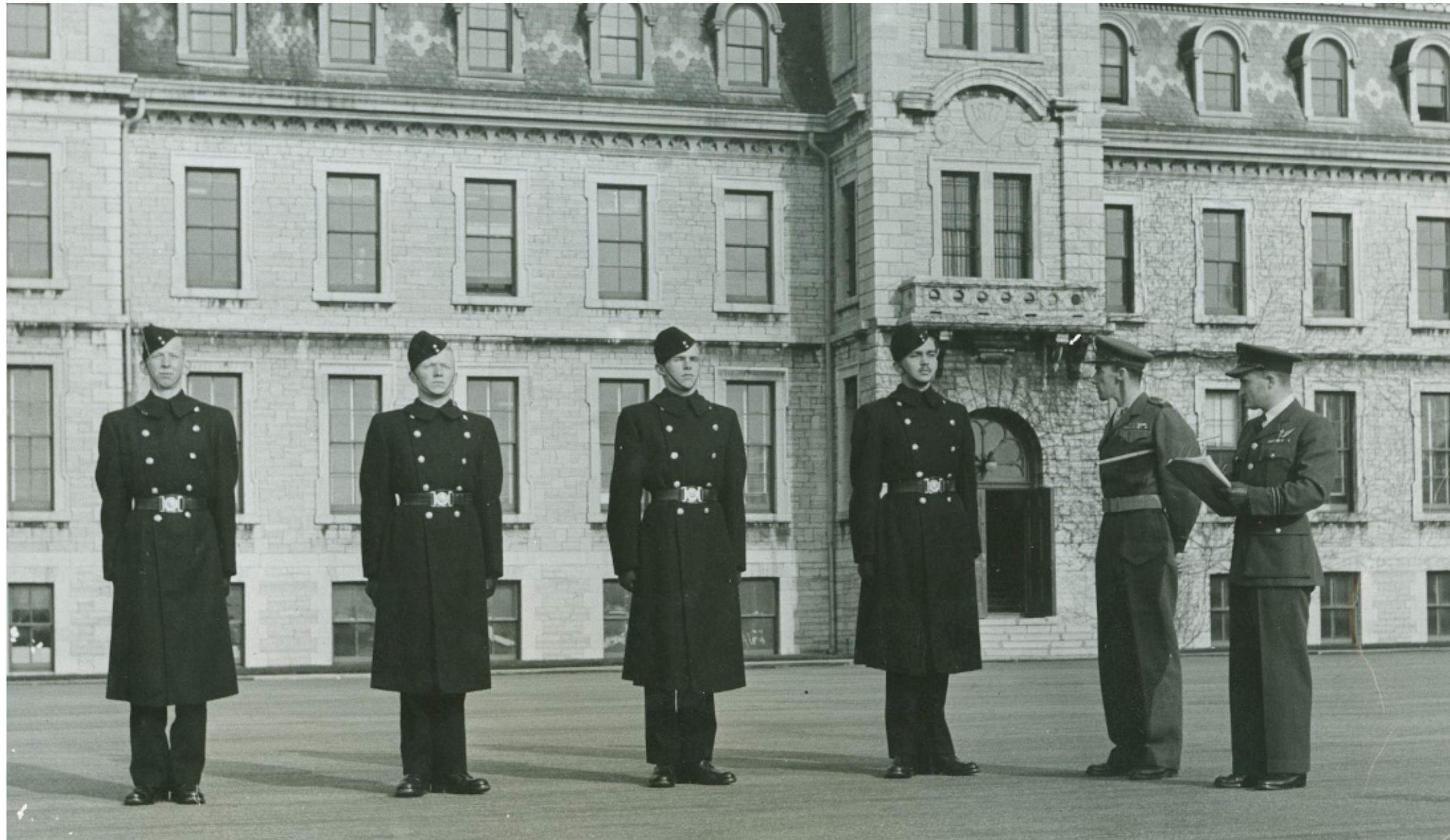
But times have changed. Paid memberships have steadily declined, and today only about 7,000 of 30,000 eligible alumni remain dues-paying members.

The RMC Alumni Association Board has voted to adopt a more inclusive, engagement-driven membership model, eliminating the cost of membership.. Effective immediately, all eligible alumni who update their contact information will be considered full voting members – at no cost.

This change removes barriers to participation, encourages broader engagement – especially among younger alumni – while aligning with best practices at Canadian universities and U.S. military academies and expanding our base to strengthen advocacy, partnerships, and fundraising.

Life members since the 2021 merger may choose a refund or convert their fee into a charitable donation (deadline 31 December 2025). Life members will continue to enjoy their 10% gift shop discount and annual branch support.

150th Anniversary of RMC

In September 2026, the Royal Military College of Canada will mark 150 years of creating Canada's leaders. Since its founding in 1876, RMC has prepared generations of Naval and Officer Cadets, graduate students, and civilian scholars who have gone on to serve and lead across Canada and around the world.

The sesquicentennial is a milestone in history, but more importantly it will be a celebration of the people and traditions that have shaped the Colleges – over 20,000 Naval and Officer Cadets from the Regular Officer Training Plan and the University Training Plan for Non-Commissioned Members, over 5,000 Canadian and international military students from Graduate Studies programs, and over 1,000 other Canadians from bachelor's degree programs. 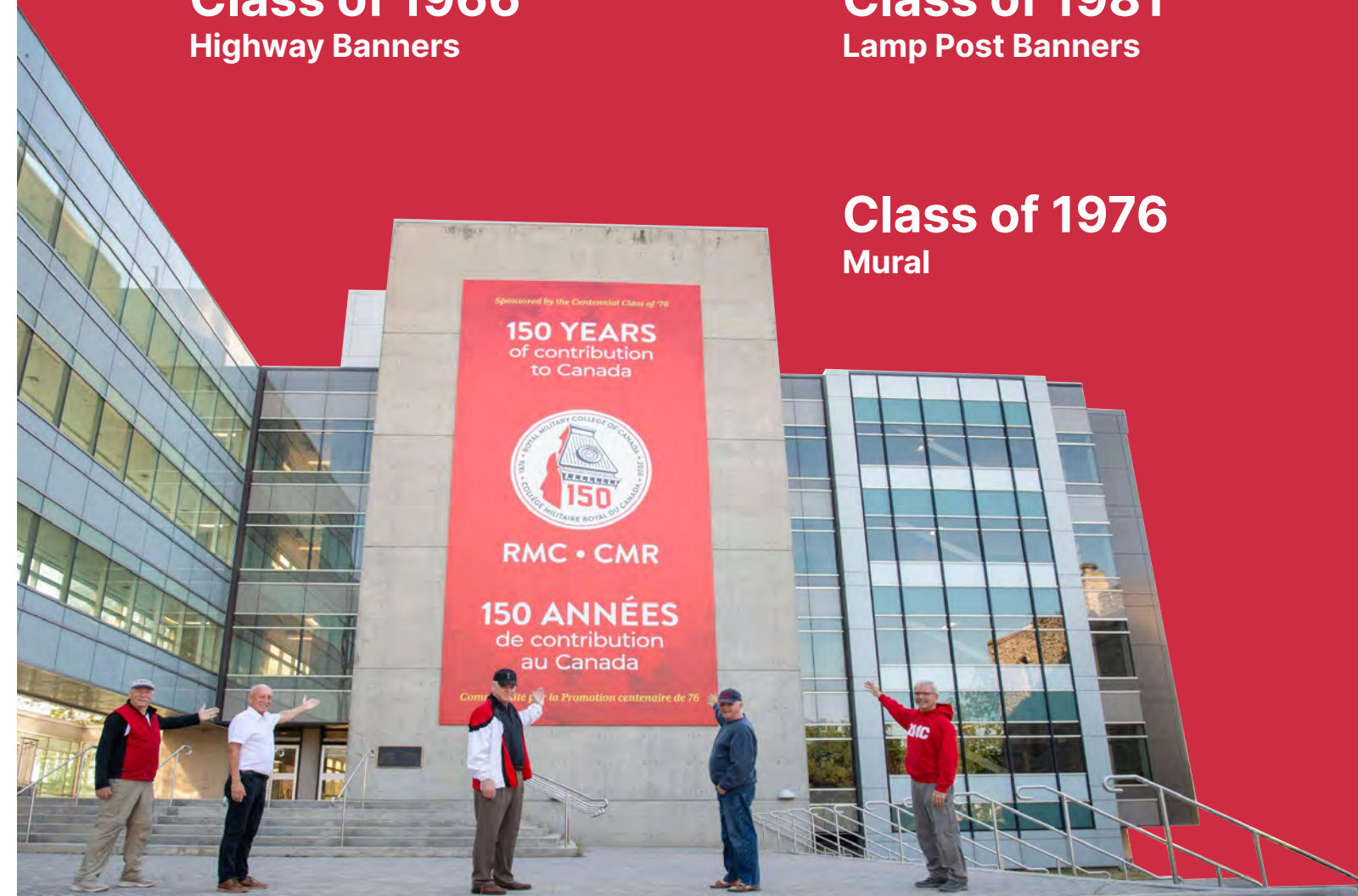
